COVER COMPOSER AMY INMAN BARNES

I can't tell you how utterly surprised and delighted I am to learn that my fraternity song's title, "Music Is Our Call," has been chosen as the theme for this year's convention. I have been asked to share some memories about its creation, not an easy task considering it was about 30 years ago. I don't know which is harder to believe, that my composition has received attention or that it's been that long since its birth!

At the time, I was an undergraduate student at Drury University in Springfield, Missouri working on a Bachelor of Music degree in both flute and music theory/composition. I had been initiated into the Iota Mu chapter of Sigma Alpha Iota and was heavily involved in its activities. When I heard about the fraternity song contest, I thought it would be fun to give it a try, never really having any aspirations that an entry from me would win.

The idea was mulling around in my head for a few days, along with all the rituals and tenets of our sisterhood that I was trying to instill in our chapter's pledges that year. When I had time to finally put pencil to paper, the lyrics came first, and I believe they came relatively easily, except for one phrase, the very phrase that you have chosen for this year's theme: Music Is Our Call.

I wanted so badly to say "calling," because

that was my initial thought. We were training for some type of career in music, whether it was performance, or therapy, or education. It would become our calling. However, the word didn't fit rhythmically in the poem. It was one syllable too many. I wrestled with how to rewrite the darn thing so that it said what I wanted it to say but still fit into the jigsaw of the larger work. I finally tried shifting my thinking and reconciling myself with the word "call," because nothing else seemed quite right.

I finally realized that "call" wasn't going to go away. It was there because it should be there. "Call" was, indeed, the right word. While we are called to our professions, and for some of us perhaps, our careers have turned out much more differently than we had planned, music will always be our "call."

It calls to us. It has drawn us in and will not let us go. It feeds our souls like nothing else ever has or ever will.

Music is also our call, the thing we send out into the universe, the thing we use to draw others into our sphere. It is one way we communicate with others using the only language that is globally understood, and we need it to speak with one another, perhaps more now than ever before.

Once the words were in place, I remember going into a stuffy little closet of a practice room

in Clara Thompson Hall and sitting down at the piano. The music for this song came in one of those glorious, effortless moments that happens all too rarely for a writer, those times when you feel like the conduit rather than the creator. I had the notes jotted down in minutes, as if they were impatient to get out into the world.

I took my staff paper back to my dorm room to make a nicer, final copy, popped it into an envelope, and mailed it to the address on the contest announcement, never dreaming any more would come of it. I can't begin to tell you how bowled over I was to receive the news that it had won and would be published in the fraternity's song book. That encouraged me in my writing more than anything else ever could.

Again, though, I underestimated my little song. Life went on, and I didn't give the song another thought. A few years later, I met a fellow SAI sister from Kansas City in the music store where we were working, and she told me that she knew my song. Her alumnae chapter had been singing it from time to time. I couldn't believe it. And now, here we are, and once again, I can't believe it. I am truly touched that "Music Is Our Call" meant enough to you to become the inspiration for this convention's theme, and thank you for that honor from the bottom of my heart.

PERFORMANCES: As crazy a time as this has been, I am lucky enough to be able to continue doing what I do as a composer. And now that performing ensembles are figuring out safe ways to perform, I'm happy to report that my concert calendar is starting to fill up again. On December 10, the Atlanta Symphony will perform my "Passacaglia" (brass ensemble version) on a virtual concert and I'm looking forward to a concert of my works at the Alte Schmiede in Vienna, Austria, this summer (I hope to be able to travel there for it, but of course that remains to be seen). Another performance I look forward to is the premiere of my solo sonata by violinist Megan Healy on May 9th, live-streamed from the PianoForte Studios in Chicago. She will then perform the sonata with dancers of the Life/Art Dance Ensemble on May 15th and 16th in Northglenn, CO, and then in Elgin, IL, on May 23rd.

PUBLICATIONS: From Carl Fischer is my latest piece for string orchestra, "On a Swing," awarded Editors' Choice at J.W. Pepper.

NEWS: My "Concerto for Trumpet" is required repertoire for the Ryan Anthony Memorial Competition of the International Trumpet Guild, as well as optional repertoire for the Susan Slaughter Solo Competition of the International Women's Brass Conference.

The sort of thing composers only dream about: a full concert of our works, in Vienna! The dream came true in June - I'd been contacted by the concert venue Alte Schmiede about doing a concert of my works, asking my permission. Permission? You bet! I was allowed to choose three instruments and suggest a recital program. The resulting concert was absolutely incredible, and I am happy (and grateful) to say that I got to witness it in-person.

I was recently interviewed for a podcast by Diversify the Stand. I talk about what I see as a problem with new music in academia, how I got into composing, and my current composition project.

The big project I'm planning, which couldn't be more impractical during this time (but I'm

going to do it anyway!) is an opera. A few years back I discovered the story of Anton Schmid, an Austrian drafted into working for the Wehrmacht during World War II, who conducted undercover operations to save hundreds of Jews of the Vilna ghetto in what was then Poland. I find his story, and the times and setting, fascinating, and I believe it is a story that needs to be told. I have my concept, plenty of original sources for research, experience writing opera, and connections to that world, and the rest of the story...has yet to unfold.

NEWS: During 2020 Howard J. Buss received an AscaPlus Award from the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers in recognition of significant performances of his music. His composition "Vibrant Horizons" for flute and band was Finalist-Honorable Mention for The American Prize. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic all of the live concerts of his music planned after the middle of March were canceled. However, there were many live-streamed performances of his music on Facebook and other platforms. He was commissioned in late 2019 by Victoria Ward, LTD and the Bloomsbury Woodwind Ensemble of London, England to compose "Skylines" for woodwind sextet.

He is founder and editor of Brixton Publications (ASCAP) and Howard J. Buss Publications (BMI), which publish concert music by American composers. REFLECTIONS: Somehow reaching old age gives one a sense of privilege – the right to speak out. And so I am doing just that – speaking to the wind – telling of my joys and my unfulfilled wishes. I have been a composer for most of my life – from age 6 and still at age 87 it is my profession. Of course I had to do odd jobs for many years in order to put bread on the table. So, after earning my degrees in music and music history, (1956, 1960), I resorted to teaching music in the public school system. In my day there were few, if any, jobs for female music historians. I had no predecessors to open doors. Along the way I married for love only and not to gain status. I composed—so called serious music—for many years for the joy of creating music. I struggled to find performers – paid their stipends from my own shallow pockets. In the 1980's I presented recitals of my music in the prestigious Weill Hall at New York City's Carnegie Hall.

On occasion I would get a commission for new music – and often would submit scores to publishers – none of whom actually were interested. Then I ventured into the realm of opera composition in 1967 – composing a children's opera for performance by kindergarteners in my charge, great fun but no stipend. During the next 20 years, I wrote over 300 small compositions for various ensemble combinations. Then in 2001 The Tug Hill Land Trust commissioned "Essences of the North Country" for chamber orchestra. It was successfully programmed by several conductors in the U. S. and Canada.

While in Canada, I worked on several versions of my opera, "Molly of the Mohawks," based on the life of the Mohawk Loyalist, Molly Brant. In 2006, the conductor, Charles

Schneider took an interest in the opera and with his direction and editing, we had several successful performances in 2008. However, I had no real “angels” to help. The endeavor nearly ended in bankruptcy for me. Still I persevered; a film-producer from California came on the scene with actual money. “Molly” was to be filmed in the Mohawk Territory at St. Regis in 2013– again with Charles Schneider as director and conductor. But, no film – too many mistakes in the filming. Thankfully we had enough money to pay all the participants.

Then in 2014 we presented a concert version of “Molly of the Mohawks” for the Loyalist Association of Canada in Toronto with the original Molly, Rhona Gale. Maestro Schneider at the keyboard and bass Eric Johnson, the original “William” in the opera in 2008 and 2013. Once again, the music was an artistic success. Since then, I have been composing more scores and have entered a couple of competitions. Recently I won First Prize from Clarinet Society in the U.K.

The melodies were collected and transcribed by Frances Densmore - a native of Red Wing, MN - in the early 1900s and published by the Smithsonian Institution.

Dr. Patrick O'Shea conducted the Saint Mary's Concert Band with Dr. Janet Heukeshoven performing as soloist. The composition was commissioned for the Minnesota Ambassadors of Music 2020 European tour which was canceled due to the pandemic. (Dr. Janet Heukeshoven is SAI chapter faculty advisor at Saint Mary's.)

PUBLICATIONS: Carl Fisher has indicated that "Fanfare for Hope" (for concert band) will be published in their 2022 catalog.

RECORDINGS: "TafelJazz" featuring 13 original composition was recorded during Summer 2021. The album featuring H30 Jazz Trio (the composer and his two sons) and several friends

Movement 1, "Two Hearts, Four Hands" sets Ravel's first movement (Sleeping Beauty's Pavane) for the Carlson's four main instruments – piano, viola, horn, and double bass.

Movement 2, "The Bugler and the Band," features the solo horn. The movement turns fragments of the 1st movement (now in major) into a swinging Big Band setting honoring Jim Carlson's time in the Navy and his love for Big Band swing music.

Movement 3, "Slightly Off-Broadway," featuring solo viola, finds themes from Ravel's 4th movement (Beauty and the Beast) set for the bright lights of Broadway. The title refers to the Carlson's home in Winona which was located one block away from that city's Broadway.

Movement 4, "At the Opera," reflects on Mary Ellen Carlson and her twin sister's love for opera. Themes from Ravel's 5th movement (The Magic Garden) are woven into a setting of grand proportions. Solo piano is featured throughout the 4th movement.

"Life Love Music" ends as it began, with the the original four instruments first accompanied by the full ensemble and eventually returning to the simplicity of the four together to bring the composition to a peaceful conclusion.

The 2022 IAMA Composer-Judges

As we approach the 2022 SAI National Convention this summer, we'd like to briefly introduce the two Composer-Judges for the 2022 International American Music Awards (IAMA) Composition Competition. IAMA provides both the selected winner and the composer-judges with the opportunity for publication, through C.F. Peters, as well as a public performance of their works at the national convention. A full write-up about each composer is available in the Winter 2022 issue of *PAN PIPES*.

Andrea Clearfield

(b. 1960) is an award-winning composer of music for chorus, orchestra, opera, chamber ensemble, dance, and multimedia collaborations. Clearfield creates deep, emotive musical languages that build cultural and artistic bridges. She was appointed the Steven R. Gerber Composer in Residence with the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia for their 2018-19 season and is the 2020-2022 Composer-in-residence with National Concerts at Carnegie Hall. Her works are performed widely in the U.S. and abroad. Among her 150+ works are eleven large-scale cantatas, including *Kabo Omowale*, commissioned by The Philadelphia Orchestra. Her cantata, *Tse Go La*, for double chorus, electronics, and chamber orchestra is inspired by her music fieldwork documenting Tibetan melodies in the Himalayas.

She is a recipient of a 2017 Independence Foundation Fellowship in the Arts, a 2016 Pew Fellowship, and was awarded fellowships at the American Academy in Rome, the Rockefeller Foundation's Bellagio Center, The MacDowell Colony, Blue Mountain Center, Wurlitzer Foundation of New Mexico, and the Copland House, among others. She was keyboardist with the Relâche Ensemble for 25 years and was honored to have been invited to perform with the Court of the Dalai Lama. She has been invited as visiting composer to numerous universities and colleges including Yale-National University of Singapore, Curtis Institute of Music, University of Texas at Austin, and the Rimsky Korsakov Conservatory in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Clearfield is in demand as a curator, adjudicator, speaker, and concert host. Attendees of SAI's 2018 National Convention will no doubt remember her transfixing Keynote Speech called: "Creating the Cantata, Tse Go La (At the Threshold of this Life): My Experience at Pan's Cottage." She

has served on the Board of Directors of the Recording Academy (Grammy's) Philadelphia Chapter. Her music is published by Boosey & Hawkes, G. Schirmer, Hal Leonard, and Seeadot. Dr. Clearfield served on the composition faculty at The University of the Arts from 1986–2011. She received a DMA from Temple University. A passionate advocate for building community around the arts, she is also the founder and host of the renowned Salon

featuring contemporary, classical, jazz, electronic, dance and world music since 1986 and winner of Philadelphia Magazine's "Best of Philadelphia" award.

The music of **Amy Riebs Mills** (b.1955) is known for its melodic beauty, rhythmic intensity and harmonic richness, and has been enthusiastically received by audiences around the world. Complementing a successful conducting career that has spanned over four decades, Amy Riebs Mills is increasingly in demand as a composer, writing in all genres. She has guest conducted orchestras on four continents. She has served on the faculty of the Conductors' Institute at Bard College and frequently serves as an adjudicator and clinician.

In a Mexican debut, Ms. Mills conducted the world premiere of her orchestral work, *Ha Shamayim*, (based on images from the Hubble telescope) with the Aguascalientes Symphony, in a concert broadcast on television and radio. Megumi Kanda, principal trombonist of the Milwaukee

Symphony, commissioned and premiered Ms. Mills' virtuoso piece for trombone, *Red Dragonfly*, at the 2013 International Trombone Festival, and premiered the band version in 2015 at the American Trombone Workshop with the US Army Band.

For fourteen seasons Amy Mills was Music Director of the La Crosse Symphony Orchestra in Wisconsin. As a guest conductor, internationally Maestra Mills has led Dubna Symphony Orchestra (Russia), Israel Kibbutz Orchestra, and Rio De Janeiro Philharmonic (Brazil), among others. In the United States she has guest conducted the Acadiana Symphony in Louisiana, the Arlington Symphony of Virginia, and the Traverse Symphony in Michigan. She led the Houston Symphony on a program for the presidential inauguration in 1988, and also conducted New York City's Center Symphony and served as cover conductor for the National Symphony Orchestra.

In 1992, Ms. Mills founded and served as Music Director of the National Women's Symphony in Washington, D.C., a professional orchestra featuring the music not only of recognized masters but distinguished women composers, presenting premieres of works by Libby Larsen [SAI Member Laureate], Pulitzer Prize winner Melinda Wagner, SAI Honorary Member Jennifer Higdon, and Augusta Read Thomas.

Prior to her appointment in La Crosse, Ms. Mills was the youngest Music Director of the U.S. Air Force Band, Orchestra, and Chorus. She was the first woman to serve as Music Director of the U.S. Air Force Singing Sergeants, conducting the 27 member full-time professional chorus in over 350 concerts around the country.

Maestra Mills is an initiate of SAI's Beta Chapter, Northwestern University; former affiliate of the Washington, D.C. Alumnae Chapter; and a member of the SAI Composers Bureau. She holds a doctorate in conducting from Catholic University, and a bachelor's and master's degree in music from Northwestern University.

Remembering James Cohn

Composer James M. Cohn died on June 12, 2021 at the age of 93. He was an SAI National Arts Associate, initiated by the Tulsa Alumnae Chapter in 1998, and a longtime member of the SAI Composers Bureau. James served as an Inter-American Music Awards (IAMA) Composer/ Judge at SAI's 2006 National Convention in Orlando, FL, where his commissioned chamber work, *Trio No. 2* for Piano, Violin, and Cello, was premiered. He and his wife, SAI Patroness Eileen Cohn, continued to support SAI in numerous ways in the following years.

Born in 1928 in Newark (NJ), he studied composition with Roy Harris, Wayne Barlow, and Bernard Wagenaar, and graduated from Juilliard, where he earned two degrees in music composition: a Bachelor's Degree in 1949 and his Masters Degree in 1950. His wife, Eileen, shared a related anecdote: "It might be of interest for you to know that for Jim's entrance exam into Juilliard in 1945, he was instructed to write a Fugue. Jim wrote a Double Fugue and was immediately given a Full Scholarship for all years of study!" He later pursued postgraduate studies with Ruth Anderson at Hunter College.

He lived and worked in New York City for many years. Cohn served as a musicologist for ASCAP from 1954 to 1984, and was also the inventor of electronic devices that could be applied to keyboards or fingerboards in order to control pitch, intonation, volume, and vibrato.

He composed solo, chamber, choral, and orchestral works, many of which won awards. Mr. Cohn was the recipient of numerous honors, including the Queen Elisabeth of Belgium Prize in 1953 for his *Symphony No. 2* (premiered in Brussels, Belgium) and the A.I.D.E.M. prize for his *Symphony No. 4* (premiered in Florence, Italy). Additionally, Mr. Cohn's opera, *The Fall of the City*, won an Ohio University Opera Award. Mr. Cohn was honored to have been profiled in the April 2019 issue of the B'nai B'rith International Magazine.

Eileen added, "Jim has had many, many honors bestowed upon him over the years. He was asked



by the United States Government to accompany the Russian Composer Dmitri Shostakovich on his tour around New York when he visited. Jim took Maestro Shostakovich to Lincoln Center and to the Library at Lincoln Center, and the Maestro wanted to see the inner workings of ASCAP—Jim's employer for 32 years. Another was the McKim Fund from the Library of Congress for his work *Concerto Da Camera*—the 3rd movement of which honored the 400th anniversary of the Friendship Pact between the United States and the Netherlands."

Mr. Cohn's catalogue includes solo, choral, chamber, and orchestral works, including nine symphonies, five piano sonatas, and three string quartets; his commissioned music for television and cinema has been used worldwide. James Cohn quickly became an accessible and highly desired composer who received commissions from a variety of artists, such as: the Quintet of the Americas; Argentinian pianist Miriam Conti; violinist Eric Grossman; the Library of Congress; Pennsylvania's "Music at Gretna" festival; cellist Marcel Krasner; flutists Jerene Weitman and Carla Auld; English hornist Pedro Diaz (principal, New

York Metropolitan Opera Orchestra); Belgian clarinet ensemble Claribel, under the direction of Guido Six; and Palisades Virtuosi Chamber Ensemble, to name a few.

"Of the many commissions that he received, 3 stand out," said Eileen. "The McKim Fund for the Library of Congress, Pedro Diaz (Principal English Hornist of the Metropolitan Opera) for his *Concerto for English Horn and String Orchestra*—premiered in Costa Rica by the National Orchestra in (I believe) 2017 and then in 2019 in Tampa, FL at the International Double Reed Society Convention—and then the commission most dear to his hear...from his Sisters in the Tulsa Chapter of SAI, where he had been initiated in 1998, to write a new work to honor the 75th anniversary of the chapter's charter. Jim wrote a wonderful piece and we were able to get to Tulsa for the Concert."

Notable performances of his works include concerts given at the Kennedy Center and the Library of Congress, as well as recitals at numerous music conferences and festivals. His recorded music is currently available on Naxos American Classics, MSR Music Classics, and the XLNT Music label. Critics have lauded his music many times, including the American Record Guide: "I am an unabashed fan of the music of James Cohn...Thus I was excited by the prospect of a new clarinet concerto (*No. 1*)...and I was not disappointed. It is melodic and charming, without sounding old-fashioned or stuffy...Cohn seems not to mind writing music that one can enjoy, and I applaud him for it." They also said of his *Wind Quintet*, "Imagine: here is contemporary music – Sonatas & Chamber Music — that is easy to listen to and enjoyable, with infectious good humor and high spirits."

His wife was very happy to share news of upcoming performances of his music: "On March 5th, the World Premiere of Jim's *Concertino for Flute & String Orchestra* will be performed at a concert presented by the Flute Society of Greater Philadelphia at the University of West Chester. The work will be premiered only with Flute and 5 Strings. The artist, Carla Auld, commissioned the *Concertino* sometime in 2020 and Jim completed it in February of 2021 (the month of his 93rd

birthday). He also decided, in view of Covid, to write a piano reduction of the *Concertino*. This was premiered in a local concert series and the reaction was wonderful. One of the audience members videotaped Carla and this recording was submitted to the Flute Society.”

On February 22nd, Cohn’s *Toccata and Fugue* for solo classical guitar will be presented at a local concert series by Tuesday Morning Music Club, but not by the commissioning artist (David Galvez, from Peru). In March, another World

Premiere of *Tick-Tock Serenade* for the group Flutissimo (3 flutes & Piano) will be performed. His *Klezmer Fantasy for Clarinet and Piano* will be premiered in June 2022 at ClarinetFest by the commissioning artist, Caroline Hartig, former President of the International Clarinet Association, and his *Fanfare and March* for the St. Thomas Orchestra in Mamaroneck, NY will be premiered in July 2022.

He also completed a few new commissions in 2021: a *Sonata for 2 Bb Clarinets* for Dr.

Robert Spring, Professor of Woodwind Studies at Arizona State University, and a new piece for Soprano Yolanda Johnson for an Art & Music Project for the Fall based on the Paul Gauguin painting “3 Tahitians.”

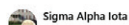

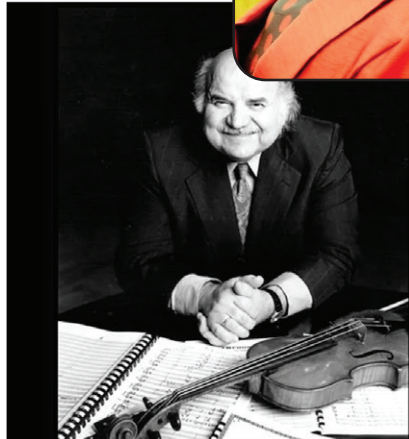
SAI Composers Bureau member Libby Larsen is one of America's most performed living composers. She has composed over 500 works, including orchestra, opera, vocal and chamber music, symphonic winds, and band. Her work is widely recorded. Larsen's 2017 biography, "Libby Larsen: Composing an American Life," Denise Von Glahn, author, is available from University Illinois Press. An advocate for the music and musicians of our time, in 1973 Larsen co-founded the Minnesota Composers Forum, now the American Composer's Forum. A Grammy Award winner and former holder of the Papamarkou Chair at John W. Kluge Center of the Library of Congress, Larsen has also held residencies with the Minnesota Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, and the Colorado Symphony. A number of her works had premieres within the last year, including: "The Other Side of Silence" performed by Mary Bonhag, soprano, and Michael Brofman, piano, on May 15, 2021, for the Brooklyn Art Song Society; "A Tarantella for Our Times," performed by Osmo Vanska, clarinet, and Erin Keefe, violin, on June 24, 2021, at ACCENT in Minneapolis, MN; and "The Supreme Four," by the Sunflower Music Festival Orchestra, JoAnn Falletta, conductor, on June 24, 2021, as part of the Sunflower Music Festival in Topoka, KS. sai_nh SAI Composers Bureau member Robert Xavier Rodríguez has written music in many genres — opera, orchestral, concerto, ballet, vocal, choral, chamber, solo, and music for the theater — but he has been drawn most strongly in recent years to works for the stage, including music for children. Rodríguez received his early musical education in San Antonio (b. 1940) and in Austin (UT), Los Angeles (USC), Lenox (Tanglewood), Fontainebleau (Conservatoire Américain) and Paris. His teachers have included Nadia Boulanger, Jacob Druckman, Bruno Maderna, and Elliott Carter. Rodríguez currently holds the Endowed Chair of University Professor at The University of Texas at Dallas, where he is Director of the Musica Nova ensemble. His 1991 opera "Frida," based on the life of Mexican painter Frida Kahlo, has become one of the most acclaimed and often-performed contemporary operas in the United States. Recent performances of his works include "Monkey See, Monkey Do" (opera) performed by Opera Nova in VA, as well as "The Dot and the Line" (narrator and chamber ensemble) and "A Colorful Symphony" (narrator and orchestra) performed by the Dayton Philharmonic Broadcast on DiscoverClassical.org. Rodríguez's new publications include "Harlequin's Rainbow" for mezzo-soprano and string quartet (available through G. Schirmer).
